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**THE KAMBULA PRIDE = 21**

While the compositions of Groups B and C have shifted slightly this month, we will continue to refer to the fragments of this pride in Groups A – C (see August Game Report for the composition breakdown), denoting changes where applicable.

The most consistent of the three groups remains Group A. While their movements are erratic, the two lionesses and two female cubs are a stable unit. They were seen on five days this month. The first time they were seen was on the 2<sup>nd</sup>, when they were south of Matshapiri Open Area. On the 4<sup>th</sup>, they were at the Boom Hut. The final sighting was on the 31<sup>st</sup>, when they were northeast of Mlowathi Dam.

Individuals from Kambula Group B were seen on six days this month. The older of the young females from this sub-group was not with this group at all this month. It is likely she has linked up with Kambula Group C as she comes of mating age. Kambula Group B are moving haphazardly. They were recorded at Mlowathi Dam, Bicycle Crossing, the Old Airstrip, and in the Manyeleti River, where they had a buffalo kill on the 5<sup>th</sup>.

Kambula Group C (the lionesses not accounted for in groups A and B), spent the majority of their time with the Ndhzenga males, their noteworthy sightings are accounted for in the Ndhzenga males section of this report.

**THE MARTHLY PRIDE = 1**

The remaining Marthly lioness was seen on nine days this month.

This lioness was at Matumi Rocks on the 1<sup>st</sup>. She was at Bicycle Crossing on the 7<sup>th</sup>. By the 9<sup>th</sup> she had moved south and was around Wildebeest Loop. The furthest south she was recorded was on the 12<sup>th</sup> when she was south of Maurice's Pan. The remaining sightings of this lioness took place between the Causeway and Bicycle Crossing.

The full complement of this pride was seen for the first time on the 6<sup>th</sup>, when they shared the remains of a buffalo south of Ostrich Koppies. All lions were south of Ostrich Koppies again on the 7<sup>th</sup>. On the 8<sup>th</sup>, only the sub-adult's and one lioness were seen around the Sausage Spot. Two lionesses were southeast of Gowrie Circle on the 22<sup>nd</sup>. The last sighting of the month was four sub-adult males and three sub-adult females were at Bicycle Crossing on the 23<sup>rd</sup>.

Members of this pride were seen on three days this month. The first sighting was on the 18<sup>th</sup>, when all 14 lions fed on a buffalo carcass in northern Toulon. The full complement was seen on Toulon again on the 25<sup>th</sup>. Finally, this pride was north of Ivory Pan on the 27<sup>th</sup>.

## MALE LIONS

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### **THE NDHZENGA MALES = 4**

2 ADULT MALES ± 7 YEARS 8 MONTHS

2 ADULT MALES ± 7 YEARS 3 MONTHS

*WESTERN MALAMALA, FLOCKFIELD & CHARLESTON*

*Dominant over the Kambula and Styx Prides.*

*First Encountered on MalaMala September 2020*

(33 sightings)

In 15 of the 33 sightings of these males, lionesses from the Kambula pride were present. Again, this month, records suggest that the male with the 'club footed' is fast becoming estranged.

#### Noteworthy sightings:

- On the 3<sup>rd</sup>, three males were with six lionesses from the Kambula pride north of the Windmill. The male with the 'club foot' was with one lioness at the 5-Star junction.
- On the 4<sup>th</sup>, the same three males and six lionesses were at the Windssock.
- The same group as above was south of Beaumont's Camp on the 5<sup>th</sup>, where they stole a kudu carcass from the Styx pride.
- Three males and seven Kambula lionesses killed a buffalo at the Windmill on the 11<sup>th</sup>.
- Three of the males were with lionesses south of West Street Crossing on the 22<sup>nd</sup>.
- The male with the 'club foot' was found roaring around West Street Crossing on the 25<sup>th</sup>.
- The three males and seven lionesses killed a buffalo in the rain on the 27<sup>th</sup>, at Old Trollip's Crossing. They fed on their kill the following day.

### **THE NORTHERN AVOCA MALES = 2**

2 ADULT MALES ± 9 YEARS 4 MONTHS

*WESTERN EYREFIELD*

*Dominant over the Nkuhuma pride.*

*First encountered in late 2019.*

(0 sightings)

For the first time in more than a year neither of these two males was seen on MalaMala. Towards the end of the month, we received news that the frailer of the two males had died. With pressure mounting on the remaining male and the presence of the third male from this coalition been seen several times in recent months, it'll be interesting to see if these estranged brother link back up.

### **THE SOUTHERN AVOCA MALES = 2**

2 ADULT MALES ± 9 YEARS 8 MONTHS

*SOUTHERN CHARLESTON*

*Dominant over the Sand River Pride.*

*First encountered on MalaMala Game Reserve*

(0 sightings)

The Southern Avoca males were not recorded on MalaMala in October.

### Other Lions Encountered:

- They **STYX PRIDE** lost their kudu kill to the members of Kambula Group C and Ndhzenga males on the 5<sup>th</sup>, south of Beaumont's Camp. Three lionesses and six cubs were west of Trollip's Camp on the 8<sup>th</sup>.
- An **unidentified** lioness was at Wildebeest Crossing on the 30<sup>th</sup>.
- The **GOWRIE MALE** was alone at Elephant Rock on the 9<sup>th</sup>. He was with the **NKUHUMA YOUNG MALE** west of Emsagwen Waterhole on the 12<sup>th</sup>. The two lions were around Matshapiri Dam on the 15<sup>th</sup> with the Nkuhuma young male sporting a cut and bruised right eye, presumably caused by the Gowrie male while fighting over a kill.
- The third estranged **NORTHERN AVOCA MALE** was viewed twice this month with one of his sons from the Talamati Pride. This first sighting was near the hippo pools west of Bicycle Crossing on the 24<sup>th</sup> and the second sighting was at Mlowathi Dam on the 26<sup>th</sup>.

#### FEMALE LEOPARDS:

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#### **THE ISLAND FEMALE**

9 YEARS 8 MONTHS

WESTERN FLOCKFIELD, SOUTHERN MALAMALA

*Daughter of the Tamboti female, independent first quarter of 2015.*

*Mother of the Drum Crossing female.*

(10 sightings)

The Island female is spending time in the western section of her territory. On six of the 10 days she was seen, she was west of the Sand River. The most east she was seen was on the 7<sup>th</sup> when she was around Buffalo Pans.

The most interesting sighting of this female was on the 2<sup>nd</sup> when she stole a kill from a Cape hunting dog. Shortly after she stole the impala, it was stolen from her by hyenas. Being an opportunistic creature, she found a gap and stole it back, hoisting it out of reach from the hyenas who lingered.

#### **THE DRUM CROSSING FEMALE**

2 YEARS 2 MONTHS

SOUTHERN MALAMALA

*Daughter of the Island female, independent February 2022.*

(9 sightings)

We enjoyed nine days of viewing this leopard this month. Sightings of this young female are of continued concentration around central MalaMala, between the Sand and Matshapiri Rivers. The furthest south she was recorded was on the 8<sup>th</sup>, when she was east of Flockfield Lookout. In five of the nine sightings, she was in the area of Maurice's Pan.

WESTERN MALAMALA &amp; SOUTHERN MARTHLY

*Daughter of the Mashaba female, independent early 2014.**Mother of the Plaque Rock female.*

(34 sightings, 10 of female, 4 of female and cub/s, 20 of cub/s)

The Nkoveni female and her daughters continue to be seen around MalaMala Camp. This month saw a distinct decline in their activities as a trio. Both daughters are seen in overlapping areas within their mother's territory, this is expected to shift as they will inevitably grow less tolerant of each other. Furthermore, the female was seen exploring further east, perhaps in an effort to ascertain whether she could shift her territory as she creates space for her daughters.

A breakdown of the composition of the sightings of these three leopards:

- The female was recorded alone on 10 days.
- All three leopards were only seen together once.
- The female was with the 3:2 cub on three days.
- Both cubs were together without their mother on one occasion.
- The 3:2 cub was seen on her own on 10 days.
- The 2:2 cub was seen on her own on nine days.
- Excluding the one day where all three leopards were together, the 2:2 cub and the female were not recorded together.

Noteworthy sightings:

- The 3:2 cub caught a scrub hare on the 13<sup>th</sup>, at the Old Airstrip.
- The female was east of her usual range on the 23<sup>rd</sup>, when she was east of Piccadilly Triangle. She caught a scrub hare at dusk.
- The female and the 3:2 cub had an impala ewe west of the Causeway on the 25<sup>th</sup>. The 2:2 cub joined them on the 26<sup>th</sup>.

**THE PICCADILLY FEMALE**

WESTERN EYREFIELD, MARTHLY

*Daughter of the Kikilezi female, independent first quarter of 2016.*

(7 sightings)

Sightings of this female remained consistent this month. Typical of late, the Piccadilly female, was far south of her territory on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup>, when she was with the Maxim's male at Elephant Slide Crossing. She was opposite MalaMala Camp on the 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup>. She was west of Campbell Koppies on the 6<sup>th</sup>. On the 10<sup>th</sup>, she was in the heart of her territory, at Elephant Rock. She moved east and was north of Lower Mlowathi Crossing on the 11<sup>th</sup>.

**THE THREE RIVERS FEMALE  
MALE CUB**

6 YEARS 6 MONTHS  
1 YEAR 3 MONTHS

WESTERN FLOCKFIELD, WESTERN MALAMALA

*Daughter of the Kikilezi female, orphaned on 22<sup>nd</sup> May 2017.  
(6 sightings, 4 of female, 2 of female and cub, 0 of the cub)*

This mother and son duo was seen on four days this month. The most noteworthy of the six sightings was on the 19<sup>th</sup>, when the cub narrowly escaped death. While the two leopards were resting in the shade, a lioness ran in and attacked the cub. Something must have deterred the lioness because, after a brutal physical interaction, she let go and the cub was able to evade any further attacks. He has been seen since and it in good condition.

**THE SIBUYE FEMALE**

WESTERN EYREFIELD

*Daughter of the Kikilezi female, independent first quarter of 2016.  
Mother of the Tlebe Rocks female, Langa female & Xaxa male.  
(2 sightings)*

The Sibuye female was at Mlowathi Pans on the 10<sup>th</sup>. She lingered in the area south of Mlowathi Dam on the 24<sup>th</sup>, while the Ngoboswan male fed on a hoisted impala ram carcass above her.

**THE TLEBE ROCKS FEMALE  
MALE CUB**

*Daughter of the Sibuye Female, independent second quarter 2019.  
(2 sightings of female)*

This female was seen twice this month, both times without her cub. She was at the Sausage Spot on the 5<sup>th</sup>. On the 7<sup>th</sup>, this female was in the company of the Ngoboswan male at the Mlowathi Spot. The cub hasn't been seen for a few months now and there is speculation amongst the rangers to whether he is still alive.

**THE LOOKOUT FEMALE  
CUB**

NORTHERN FLOCKFIELD

*First encountered on MalaMala Game Reserve in late 2015.  
Mother of the Kapen female & the Redhawk male.  
(1 sighting, 0 of female, 1 of female and cub)*

Astonishingly, the cub of the Lookout female was seen with its mother on the 20<sup>th</sup>. The female lead her cub to a duiker kill in the Tamboti Thickets. Having not seen the cub for some time, it is a relief to know it is still around.



**THE PLAQUE ROCK FEMALE**

4 YEARS 7 MONTHS

WESTERN MALAMALA

Daughter of the Nkoveni female, independent last quarter of 2019.

(4 sightings)

We recorded the Plaque Rock female on four days this month. On the 14<sup>th</sup>, she was around the Broken Dam. She was around the Broken Dam again on the 24<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup>, where she had hoisted an impala carcass in a dead leadwood tree. On the 26<sup>th</sup>, she flaunted her elegance as she posed on a boulder at Marthly Crossing.

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**MALE LEOPARDS**

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**THE MAXIM'S MALE**

± 8 YEARS 2 MONTHS

WESTERN FLOCKFIELD &amp; MALAMALA

*First seen on MalaMala Game Reserve in early 2019.*

(15 sightings)

While less mating activity was reported from this male this month, he continues to be the most frequently seen dominant male on MalaMala. The majority of the sightings of this male occurred around West Street Bridge. On the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> he mated with the Piccadilly female around Rattray's Camp, he was alone in all of the sightings that followed.

**THE NGOBOSWAN MALE**

4 YEARS 11 MONTHS

MARTHLY &amp; WESTERN EYREFIELD

*Son of the Emsagweni female', independent late 2019.*

(3 sightings)

The Ngoboswan male was only seen on three days this month. Reports from properties to our north suggest that he is challenging the dominant males in that area. He was with the Tlebe Rocks female on the 7<sup>th</sup> at the Mlowathi Spot. 10 days later, he was at Mlowathi Pans. The last time he was seen was on the 24<sup>th</sup>, when he guarded an impala ram carcass from the Sibuye female, south of Mlowathi Dam.

**THE ACCIPITER MALE**

*First seen on MalaMala Game Reserve in late 2015.*

(1 sighting)

The only sighting of this male was on the 6<sup>th</sup>, when he was east of the White Cloth.

**THE EYREFIELD MALE**

4 YEARS 11 MONTHS

NOMADIC (Eastern Eyrefield and eastern MalaMala)

*Son of the Emsagweni female', independent late 2019.*

(0 sightings)

No sightings were recorded of this male.

**THE SPLIT ROCK MALE**

9 YEARS 0 MONTHS

**CHARLESTON**

*Son of the Ostrich Koppies female, independent latter half of 2015.*

(1 sighting)

The Split Rock male was only seen once this month. This time he was recorded in the Tamboti Thickets, significantly further north than we expect to see him.

**Other Leopards Encountered:**

- The **FLOCKFIELD MALE** was on the Charleston/Flockfield Boundary near the KNP break on the 1<sup>st</sup>.
- The **REDHAWK MALE** was near White Cloth Open Area on the 3<sup>rd</sup> and northeast of West Street Bridge on the 10<sup>th</sup>. On the 12<sup>th</sup> he was at Matshapiri Open Area Crossing.
- The two cubs of the **TENGILE FEMALE** were at KK Pans on the 5<sup>th</sup>. The female cub was in the Sand River west of KK Crossing on the 10<sup>th</sup> while her mother was at KK Pans.
- The **NTSUMI FEMALE** was seen on the western bank of Charleston on the 8<sup>th</sup>. On the 27<sup>th</sup> she was walking south from Beaumont's Camp.
- The **TSABALALA MALE** was at Emsagwen Crossing on the 9<sup>th</sup>.
- The **FLAT ROCK MALE** was north of Lower Mlowathi Crossing on the 10<sup>th</sup>, near Bicycle Crossing on the 12<sup>th</sup>. On the 15<sup>th</sup> he was at Elephant Rock. He was west of Kigelia Crossing on the 17<sup>th</sup>. On the 20<sup>th</sup> he was north of Lower Mlowathi Crossing.
- The **RIVER ROCKS FEMALE** had remains of a duiker kill southeast of the Confluence of the Sand River and the Rock Drift Donga on the 18<sup>th</sup>. On the 23<sup>rd</sup> she was on the Sand Rivers Eastern bank south of the Rock Drift Donga.
- The **XAXA MALE** was at Mlowathi Dam on the 21<sup>st</sup>.

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## CAPE HUNTING DOGS

Sightings of **Cape hunting dogs** were enjoyed on **11 days** this month. On the 22<sup>nd</sup>, a pack of eight killed an impala and a nyala around Stone Drift. The same group killed a pregnant impala ewe south of the Causeway on the 29<sup>th</sup>.

The Toulon pack were seen frequently in the south, and with their numbers totalling 41, they have become quite the spectacle.

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## CAPE BUFFALO AND ELEPHANTS

This month, **159 elephant** sightings were recorded. 145 of these sightings were of herds, while the remaining 14 were of bulls.

For a change, we enjoyed more sightings of large herds of buffalo than bulls this month. 33 of the **59 buffalo sightings** were of breeding herds.

## Other sightings of interest

The **HYENA DEN SITE** north of the Sausage Spot continues to house cubs. Four young cubs have been seen at this den.

The **HYENA DEN SITE** on the MalaMala/Flockfield Boundary is also active, but sightings of young at this den have decreased since last month.
