## LION PRIDES

### **THE KAMBULA PRIDE = 21**

As we have come to expect, this prides dynamic is incohesive.

The month's highlight was the birth of a new litter of cubs. Unfortunately, a large male leopard was seen at the den within two weeks of birth. The leopard killed all of the newest cubs.

#### **Noteworthy sightings:**

- Three lionesses were south of Campbell Koppies on the 1<sup>st</sup>.
- There were three lionesses at Kapen Rocks on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup>. On the 3<sup>rd</sup>, one lioness was seen with afterbirth, and a glimpse of three newborn cubs was caught.
- Two lionesses kept the company of two Ndhzenga males at Princess Alice Pans on the 7<sup>th</sup>.
- The lionesses with the older cubs were east of Campbell Koppies on the 9<sup>th</sup>.
- A sub-adult male was with an adult female south of the Causeway on the 12<sup>th</sup>.
- On the 14<sup>th</sup>, a sub-adult male was with four lionesses when the five lions were east of Piccadilly Triangle.
- Four lionesses and four young cubs were at Kapen Rocks on the 15<sup>th</sup>.
- Also, on the 15<sup>th</sup>, one female mated with a Ndhzenga male around Princess Alice Pans.
- The 16<sup>th</sup> was a sombre day in the life of this pride as they lost their newest litter of cubs to a male leopard.
- On the 23<sup>rd</sup>, the two lionesses and two older cubs were around Sand Pit Crossing.
- A young lioness mated with a Ndhzenga male south of the Five-Star junction on the 24<sup>th</sup>.
- Seven lionesses and two Ndhzenga males were together at Sand Pit Crossing on the 25<sup>th</sup>. The same grouping, minus one lioness, were together again on the 26<sup>th</sup> when they were in the western parts of Matshapiri Open Area.
- On the 27<sup>th</sup>, seven lionesses and two Ndhzenga males were around the White Cloth.
- The two lionesses and older cubs attempted to hunt a buffalo bull on the 30<sup>th</sup>, west of Bicycle Crossing.
- On the last evening of the month, two lionesses killed an impala in the area of Flockfield Tower.

### *WESTERN EYREFIELD*

(11 sightings)

In recent months, we have enjoyed more frequent sightings of the sub-adults of this pride. Sightings of the three females with the seven cubs remain consistent. Both groupings appear to be spending more time together.

### **Noteworthy sightings:**

- Four sub-adult males and two sub-adult females were south of Stwise on the 3<sup>rd</sup>.
- Two lionesses, seven cubs and the Northern Avoca males were at the Mlowathi Spot on the 7<sup>th</sup>.
- On the 14<sup>th</sup>, 17 members of this pride shared a buffalo cow carcass with the Northern Avoca males.
- The same group of lions was at Mlowathi Dam on the 15<sup>th</sup>. On the 16<sup>th</sup>, the sub-adults had left, and just the females, cubs and Northern Avoca males remained at Mlowathi Dam.
- On the 20<sup>th</sup>, 19 lions, including the two Northern Avoca males, killed a young buffalo bull around the Old Borehole.
- Four sub-adult males, two sub-adult females and two adult females were at the Sausage Spot on the 22<sup>nd</sup>.
- On the 23<sup>rd</sup>, three adult females, two sub-adult females, five sub-adult males, and seven cubs were together at Tlebe Rocks.
- The three lionesses, seven cubs and two Northern Avoca males were southwest of Matshapiri Dam on the 28<sup>th</sup>.
- The last time members of this pride were seen for the month was on the 30<sup>th</sup>, when five sub-adult males, two sub-adult females and one adult female were northeast of Mlowathi Dam.

### **THE MARTHLY PRIDE = 1**

The Marthly lioness made her presence known in the first half of the month, with sightings recorded on seven days, all within a kilometre radius of MalaMala Camp.

#### **Noteworthy sightings:**

- The first sighting of this lion was on the 3<sup>rd</sup> when she was west of Bicycle Crossing.
- She provided a show for guests on the 7<sup>th</sup> when she killed a baboon opposite MalaMala Camp.
- She moved north and was around Bicycle Crossing on the 14<sup>th</sup>, 15<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup>.

Finally, all 14 members of the pride were together again on the 23<sup>rd</sup>, when they were at Rocky Crossing.

*First Encountered on MalaMala September 2020*

(30 sightings)

The presence of this coalition remained constant throughout July. Sightings were recorded on 30 of the 31 days of the month. With the loss of the newest litter of Kambula cubs, we expect these males to maintain a rigorous mating schedule as the lionesses come into oestrus again.

#### Noteworthy sightings:

- One male was southwest of West Street on the 2<sup>nd</sup>.
- On the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup>, a male was alone around Flockfield Pool.
- Two males were with two females from the Kambula pride on the 7<sup>th</sup>. They were south of Princess Alice Pans.
- Only lacking one member, three males were together in Kapen Open Area on the 11<sup>th</sup>. The three were together again on the 13<sup>th</sup> north of Hyena Waterhole, this time with a lioness from the Kambula pride.
- A male mated with a lioness from the Kambula pride east of Princess Alice Pans on the 15<sup>th</sup>.
- On the 22<sup>nd</sup>, three males were with nine lionesses from the Kambula Pride around Charleston North Crossing.
- Two males kept the company of two older and two younger lionesses in Jackalsdraai Open Area on the 23<sup>rd</sup>.
- On the 24<sup>th</sup>, the male with the abdominal protrusion mated with a Kambula lioness around the Five-Star junction.
- On the 26<sup>th</sup>, a male was with a lioness from the Kambula pride east of Plank's Pan. On the same day, two more males were with six Kambula lionesses in Matshapiri Open Area.
- On the closing day of the month, one male was with three lionesses opposite Rattray's Camp. On the same day, two more males were with three Kambula lionesses opposite Maxim's Lookout. Mating activity was recorded.

### THE NORTHERN AVOCA MALES = 2

Sightings of this coalition were recorded on nine days this month. On seven of the nine days, they kept the company of members of the Nkuhuma pride. As such, details of their whereabouts are accounted for in the Nkuhuma pride section.

- An **UNKNOWN** young male was chased south from the Mlowathi Spot by the Northern Avoca males and members of the Nkuhuma pride on the 7<sup>th</sup>.
- Members of the **STYX PRIDE** were seen in northwest Toulon on the 18<sup>th</sup>.
- An **UNKNOWN** male was on the KNP Break, south of the Split Rock Donga, on the 21<sup>st</sup>.

#### **THE ISLAND FEMALE**

WESTERN FLOCKFIELD, SOUTHERN MALAMALA

*Daughter of the Tamboti female<sup>t</sup>, independent first quarter of 2015.*

*Mother of the Daughter of the Island female.*

(10 sightings; 8 of female, 1 of female and cubs, 1 of cubs)

Unfortunately, it would appear that the Island female has lost her most recent litter of cubs. Nevertheless, this month she was recorded mating with the Maxim's male and traversing territories that belong to other females, presumably searching for males to mate with.

### **Noteworthy sightings:**

- On the 4<sup>th</sup>, one cub was seen at the den-site, near the lower reaches of the Matshapiri River.
- The female joined her cub at the den site on the 5<sup>th</sup>.
- The female had a kill stolen by the Marthly lioness when she was south of the Causeway.
- The female was north of Rattray's Camp on the 21<sup>st</sup>.
- On the 27<sup>th</sup>, the Island female was around MalaMala Camp. Later that day, she linked up with the Maxim's male around Bicycle Crossing; the two were recorded mating.
- She had a young bushbuck kill east of the Old Airstrip on the 28<sup>th</sup>.
- The last sighting of this female was on the 31<sup>st</sup> when she was south of West Street.

**THE DAUGHTER OF THE ISLAND FEMALE**

SOUTHERN MALAMALA

*Daughter of the Island female, independent February 2022.*

(6 sightings)

Sightings of the daughter of the Island female were enjoyed for six days this month. One month shy of her second birthday, this charismatic leopard is almost due a name.

**Noteworthy sightings:**

- The first sighting was on the 2<sup>nd</sup> when she was west of Matshapiri Open Area.
- On the 15<sup>th</sup>, she casually strolled through a crash of dehorned rhinoceros west of Emsagwen Crossing.
- The young female was around West Street on the 26<sup>th</sup>.
- On the last day of the month, she was west of White Cloth.

**THE NKOVENI FEMALE**

9 YEARS 11 MONTHS

**2 FEMALE CUBS**

WESTERN MALAMALA &amp; SOUTHERN MARTHLI

*Daughter of the Mashaba female, independent early 2014.**Mother of the Plaque Rock female.*

(23 sightings, 7 of female, of 1 female and cub/s, 15 of cub/s)

Sightings of this group of leopards remain consistently high. While the female was only seen once with her daughters, she still accepts them in her territory and has been observed contact calling for them, even when they are too strong-willed to respond to their mother.

**Noteworthy sightings:**

- The female was alone on the 1<sup>st</sup> when she was south of the MalaMala Stones.
- The cubs were together at Bicycle Crossing on the 2<sup>nd</sup>.
- On the 3<sup>rd</sup>, the female and one cub were seen around MalaMala Camp, although not together.
- On the 14<sup>th</sup>, the 3:2 cub welcomed guests at the entrance to MalaMala Camp while her mother explored the eastern bank of the Sand River, south of the Causeway.
- Both the 3:2 cub and the 2:2 cub were seen on Jeremiah's Loop on the 17<sup>th</sup>, though they were not seen together.
- On the 21<sup>st</sup>, the female was east of the Old Airstrip.
- The 2:2 cub took her turn playing gate guard and was around the entrance to MalaMala Camp on the evening of the 28<sup>th</sup>.
- The last member of this trio to be seen for the month was the 3:2 cub. She was east of the MalaMala Stones on the 31<sup>st</sup>.

**THE SIBUYE FEMALE**

WESTERN EYREFIELD

*Daughter of the Kikilezi female, independent first quarter of 2016.**Mother of the Tlebe Rocks female, Langa female & Xaxa male.*

(1 sighting)

The only record of this female was on the 10<sup>th</sup> when she was around Mlowathi Pans. This area of her territory overlaps with her eldest daughter's territory, the Tlebe Rocks female.

True to her nature, the Tlebe Rocks female seldom walks on roads, making her a difficult leopard to track. As a result, only two sightings were recorded of this duo this month.

On the 6<sup>th</sup>, the female was alone around Mlowathi Pans. On the 26<sup>th</sup>, the Tlebe Rocks female, cub and Ngoboswan male shared the remains of a duiker kill east of Piccadilly Triangle.

**THE THREE RIVERS FEMALE  
MALE CUB**

WESTERN FLOCKFIELD, WESTERN MALAMALA

*Daughter of the Kikilezi female<sup>†</sup>, orphaned on 22<sup>nd</sup> May 2017.*  
(13 sightings, 8 of female, 5 of female and cub)

Sightings of the Three Rivers female and her cub were enjoyed on 13 days this month. Now larger than his mother, the cub of the Three Rivers female is providing top-class leopard viewing.

**Noteworthy sightings:**

- The mother and cub were together on the 2<sup>nd</sup> in the Sand River, south of West Street.
- Both leopards fed on the remains of an impala ewe south of Petrie's Camp on the 7<sup>th</sup>. They had another impala ewe kill in the same area on the 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup>.
- On the 24<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup>, the female was alone around Confluence Crossing.
- In an exciting sighting, this female was with her older sister, the Piccadilly female, and the Maxim's male, south of Confluence Crossing. Both females were recorded mating with the Maxim's male, with little aggression towards one another.
- Mother, cub and the Lookout female were in the area of West Street on the 29<sup>th</sup>. The cub entertained himself by hunting baboons in the canopy of the large trees that line the banks of the Sand River.

Neither the Emsagweni female nor her cubs were seen this month. We believe it is still too soon to speculate about her condition but remain realistic about the possibility that the sun may have set on the life of this female.

**THE PLAQUE ROCK FEMALE**

The Plaque Rock female was seen for three days in July. The most noteworthy of the three sightings included mating activity with the Maxim's male on the 23<sup>rd</sup> (south of the Causeway) and the 24<sup>th</sup> (south of West Street).

**THE PICCADILLY FEMALE**

*Daughter of the Kikilezi female<sup>†</sup>, independent first quarter of 2016.*

(7 sightings)

The Piccadilly female was one of four females seeking the attention of the Maxim's male this month. Her drive to mate compelled her to venture far from her territory in search of a suitable mate.

**Noteworthy sightings:**

- The first sighting of this leopard was on the 7<sup>th</sup> when she was in Piccadilly Triangle.
- On the 16<sup>th</sup>, she was around Elephant Rock.
- She was in the heart of the Sibuye female's territory when she had a hoisted duiker kill east of the Gowrie Boom on the 23<sup>rd</sup>.
- On the 28<sup>th</sup>, she was seen far south of her typical range around Confluence Crossing. She was not alone; both the Maxim's male and the Three Rivers female were with her. She mated with the Maxim's male regularly.
- The last sighting of this female was on the 29<sup>th</sup> when she was alone at West Street Bridge.

**THE LOOKOUT FEMALE**

NORTHERN FLOCKFIELD

First encountered on MalaMala Game Reserve in late 2015.

*Mother of the Kapen female & Son of the Lookout female.*

(11 sightings, 4 of female, 7 of female and cub)

Sightings of this female were noted on 11 days this month. Her cub remains shy and small, but slowly it is becoming comfortable around vehicles.

**Noteworthy sightings:**

- Mother and cub were in the central part of the Tamboti Thickets on the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup>.
- The pair were seen on the 13<sup>th</sup> when they were south of Styx Rocks.
- The mother took her cub to a bushbuck kill south of the Three House on the 24<sup>th</sup>. The leopards remained in the area for the next two days.
- The female made an unexpected appearance on the 29<sup>th</sup> when she was in the same area as the Three Rivers female and cub around West Street.

**THE KAPEN FEMALE

**THE MAXIM'S MALE**

WESTERN FLOCKFIELD & MALAMALA

*First seen on MalaMala Game Reserve in early 2019.*

(11 sightings)

The Maxim's male flaunted his popularity with the female leopards this month.

**Noteworthy sightings:**

- On the 23<sup>rd</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup>, he mated with the Plaque Rock female. The pair were first found south of the Causeway, but by the conclusion of their copulation, they were around Flockfield Camp.
- On the 27<sup>th</sup>, the Island female found favour with this male as the two mated around Bicycle Crossing.
- By the 28<sup>th</sup>, the Maxim's male was around Confluence Crossing, where he took turns mating with the Piccadilly and Three Rivers females.

**THE NGOBOSWAN MALE**

4 YEARS 8 MONTHS

MARTHLY & WESTERN EYREFIELD

*Son of the Emsagweni female, independent late 2019.*

(10 sightings)

Sightings of this young territorial male were consistent this month.

**Noteworthy sightings:**

- On the 5<sup>th</sup>, he was around Fred's Tree.
- On the 6<sup>th</sup>, he had remains of a porcupine kill hoisted in a tree south of Fred's Tree. Two lionesses lay in wait at the base of the tree, hoping to enjoy a taste of his unusual meal.
- He was north of Lower Mlowathi Crossing on the 9<sup>th</sup>.
- On the 19<sup>th</sup>, he was opposite MalaMala Camp.
- He visited his presumed offspring when he fed on remains of a duiker kill that the Tlebe Rocks female and cub had, east of Piccadilly Triangle on the 26<sup>th</sup>.
- The last confirmed sighting of this male was on the 29<sup>th</sup> when he was around the Causeway.

**THE ACCIPITER MALE**

± 11 YEARS 11 MONTHS

*EASTERN & CENTRAL MALAMALA & FLOCKFIELD**First seen on MalaMala Game Reserve in late 2015.*

(3 sightings)

Three sightings were enjoyed of this large male this month. He was first seen for the month on the 4<sup>th</sup> when he was north of White Cloth. The next time he was seen was on the 10<sup>th</sup>, when he was south of West Street. The last sighting of this male was on the 25<sup>th</sup> when he feasted on a duiker kill in the Ngoboswan Donga.

**THE EYREFIELD MALE**

4 YEARS 8 MONTHS

*NOMADIC (Eastern Eyrefield and eastern MalaMala)*

Son of the Emsagweni female, independent late 2019.

(2 sightings)

This nomadic male was seen twice in July.

He followed his example by killing a porcupine north of Fred's Tree on the 23<sup>rd</sup>. Unfortunately, hyenas stole his meal. He was in the same area the following day.

**THE SPLIT ROCK MALE**

8 YEARS 0 MONTH

*CHARLESTON**Son of the Ostrich Koppies female<sup>†</sup>, independent latter half of 2015.*

(1 sighting)

The only sighting of this male was west of Charleston Koppies on the 10<sup>th</sup>.

**Other Leopards Encountered:**

- On the 14<sup>th</sup>, the **TENGILE FEMALE** was with both of her cubs north of KK Crossing, where they fed on an impala ewe.
- The **INYATHINI MALE** was seen four times this month. He was seen on the first day of the month, around Cuckoo Pans. The next time he was seen was on the 8<sup>th</sup>, when he was north of Confluence Crossing. On the 18<sup>th</sup>, he made himself known as he presented himself on the Rattray's Camp main deck. The last sighting of this older male was on the 24<sup>th</sup> when he was seen at the Old Dudley Crossing.
- A relaxed **NO ID** male was northwest of Mlowathi Dam on the 13<sup>th</sup>.
- The **REDHAWK MALE** was recorded for three days. On the 2<sup>nd</sup>, he was around Matshapiri Open Area Crossing. He was around Emsagwen Open Area on the 26<sup>th</sup>.
- The **PLAQUE ROCK** female was opposite MalaMala camp on the 3<sup>rd</sup>. She mated with the Maxim's male on the 23<sup>rd</sup>, around the Causeway. The two leopards were mating again on the 24<sup>th</sup>, around West Street.
- On the 11<sup>th</sup>, the **FLAT ROCK MALE** was seen on four days this month. He was north of Kigelia Crossing on the 4<sup>th</sup>. On the 16<sup>th</sup>, he had an impala kill west of Kigelia Crossing. He remained in this area the following day.

- A **NO ID** male was south of West Street on the 15<sup>th</sup>.
- Also, on the 16<sup>th</sup>, the **FLOCKFIELD MALE** was seen around Ivory Pans.
- The **N'WETI MALE** was at Baumont's Camp on the 18<sup>th</sup>.
- The **TSHABALALA MALE** was seen once this month. On the 25<sup>th</sup>, he lost an impala ewe kill to a pack of Cape hunting dogs north of the Accipiter Donga. The **RIVER ROCKS** female was seen in central Charleston on the 20<sup>th</sup>. She was seen again on the 23<sup>rd</sup>, mating with the N'weti male on the western bank of Charleston.
- On the 28<sup>th</sup>, the **NTSUMI FEMALE** was north of Baumont's Camp. She was south of Baumont's Camp on the 31<sup>st</sup>.
- On the 31<sup>st</sup>, a nervous **NO ID** young male was at the Old Flockfield Boma Crossing.

### CHEETAH

### CAPE HUNTING DOGS

Cape hunting dogs were seen on **seven days**. Surprisingly, none of the sightings included a successful kill.

One of the more exciting sightings was on the 25<sup>th</sup> when a pack of six stole a new impala ewe kill from the Tshabalala male north of the Accipiter Donga. Four hyenas arrived within seconds of the Cape hunting dogs acquiring the kill and attempted to steal scraps.

## **CAPE BUFFALO AND ELEPHANTS**

This month we recorded **77 Cape buffalo** sightings and **158 elephant** sightings.

16 of the 77 buffalo sightings were of large herds. As we enter the last throws of winter, we will likely see more large herds of buffalo on MalaMala.

## **Other sightings of interest**

A plethora of unique species was recorded in July. Here is a list of what was seen:

- Ostrich – one female ostrich, was in the area of the Old Airstrip on the 8<sup>th</sup>.
- Secretary bird – On the 10<sup>th</sup>, a secretary bird was around the Old Airstrip.
- Honey badger – five separate sightings were recorded of honey badgers this month.
- Cape clawless otter – two Cape clawless otters were in the Sand River, south of West Street, on the 16<sup>th</sup>.
- Side striped jackal – On the 17<sup>th</sup>, one side-striped jackal was around the Airstrip.
- Spotted hyena den – On the 23<sup>rd</sup>, we were delighted to discover a spotted hyena den site. For now, it appears three fluffy cubs call the termite mound on the MalaMala Flockfield Boundary home.
